Course Description

Bienvenue! This is a second semester elementary French course that is designed to help students to continue developing both linguistic knowledge and socio-cultural awareness that allows them to feel comfortable listening, reading, writing, and speaking in French. Students will build language proficiency and cultural understanding around real-world communication skills. In this course, we will examine <u>3 main themes</u>: 2) *Comment sont-elles?,4*) *En famille and 5*) *Bon appétit!*, which correspond to Chapters 2, 4 and 5 in the course textbook *En Avant* (see Course Materials above). These themes will be presented and discussed using not only the textbook but also the lecture notes prepared by the instructor. *En Avant* follows a focused approach with systemic review and recycling of topics. It also emphasizes active learning in class and integrates modern cultural themes into each lesson.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable)

Upon engaged completion of French 1312, students can reasonably expect to be able to:

- 1. Greet others using appropriate formal and informal expressions
- 2. Spell words, use accents, count numbers, tell time and express the date
- 3. Describe age, nationality, gender, preferences, hobbies, and professions
- 4. Give short narratives using regular and irregular verbs in the present tense
- 5. Know how to order food in a French restaurant, discuss their culinary likes and dislikes and create a multimodal project of a French recipe.

Instructional Methods

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION

Language acquisition requires a steady, constant, daily exposure to meaningful authentic messages in the language you are studying. Success in this class is based on your engagement with the texts and activities both in and outside of class. It is expected that you prepare yourself in advance for each day's learning activities (see D2L Brightspace calendar). It is also expected that you will approach each class period and each learning activity with knowledge of new vocabulary and grammar related to the lesson, so that class time can be devoted to communicative activities. Only brief vocabulary and grammar explanations will be offered in class; it is your own responsibility to go over the new vocabulary and grammar explanations before coming to class and to constantly review all the material covered in class. If you are not prepared and do not actively engage in activities, your participation grade will suffer. Your instructor will assign specific exercises to be written out and turned in. You may also expect regular pop quizzes to test preparation. These quizzes are typically

administered in class, and last approximately 5 minutes. If you arrive late to class, you will miss the quiz. There are absolutely NO make-ups for missed pop quizzes. You will receive a zero for a missed quiz.

-- PLEASE NOTE: In cases of poor attendance and missed assignments:

In case of absence, you are expected to seek assistance from a classmate to find out what you missed.

However, you will <u>not</u> be penalized for absences due to participation in authorized university activities; however these must be documented in writing on letterhead from a coach, director, or other faculty member in charge and must be provided in advance of the absences. If you must miss an exam for an authorized university activity, you may make it up, provided that you make arrangements in advance.

WEEKLY HOMEWORK/POP QUIZZES/TUTORIALS

Regular attendance, daily preparation and persistent, active participation in class are essential to your success in learning French. To enable you practice French at home (or in your dorms), you will have to complete the assigned online exercises in the D2L course shell. Make sure you work on the activities related to the topics covered in class every week (and every day if possible) so that you will better assimilate the concepts worked on in class and have plenty of time to complete your homework. Keep in mind the deadlines so that you do not lose any points. Please remember that the same standards of academic integrity hold for both tests and homework.

Homework for this course is always due on Fridays by 11:59 pm.

CHAPTER TESTS

Two (2) chapter tests will be conducted in this course at the end of chapters 2 and 4. These will contain a variety of listening, reading, and writing exercises. **Please note the test dates indicated on the syllabus, as there are no make-ups.**

JOURNALS

There will be a journal entry at the end of chapters 2 and 4. These are similar to vlogs or multimodal video entries in which you will be directed to talk about certain topics tied to the chapter theme. Rubrics will be provided with each journal entry.

COLLABORATIVE MULTIMODAL WRITING WORKSHOP SESSIONS

At the end of chapter 5, you will participate in a multimodal writing project with a partner using Google Docs. This project will tentatively be held in a multimedia lab located on the second floor of the Education North building on campus. After two writing sessions, each pair will present their finished products to the class for peer-feedback.

FINAL EXAM

At the end of the course, students will take a comprehensive exam in French.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Students are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning both online and face to face. In order to assure that, all students

have the opportunity to gain from time spent in class, unless otherwise approved by the instructor; students are prohibited from engaging in any form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior (texting, eating or drinking, tardiness, making offensive remarks, talking out of turn, sleeping, overt inattentiveness, etc.) will result, minimally, in a request to leave class.

Students are also expected to prepare well for every class and review on their own, following the instructor's directions. 75% of language learning takes place outside of the classroom: class time is for answering questions and reinforcing what students studied at home. **Students cannot learn a language by just coming to class!**
